

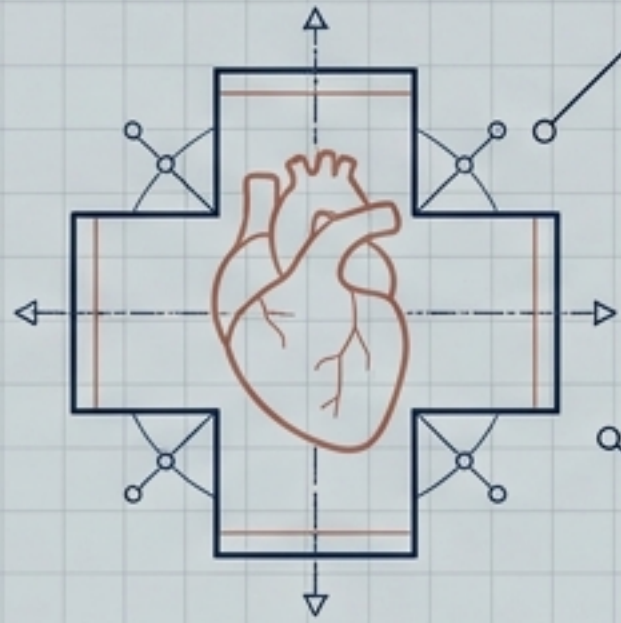

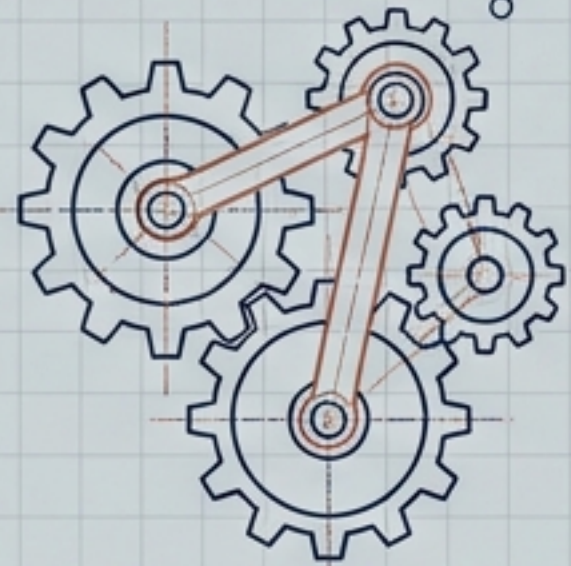

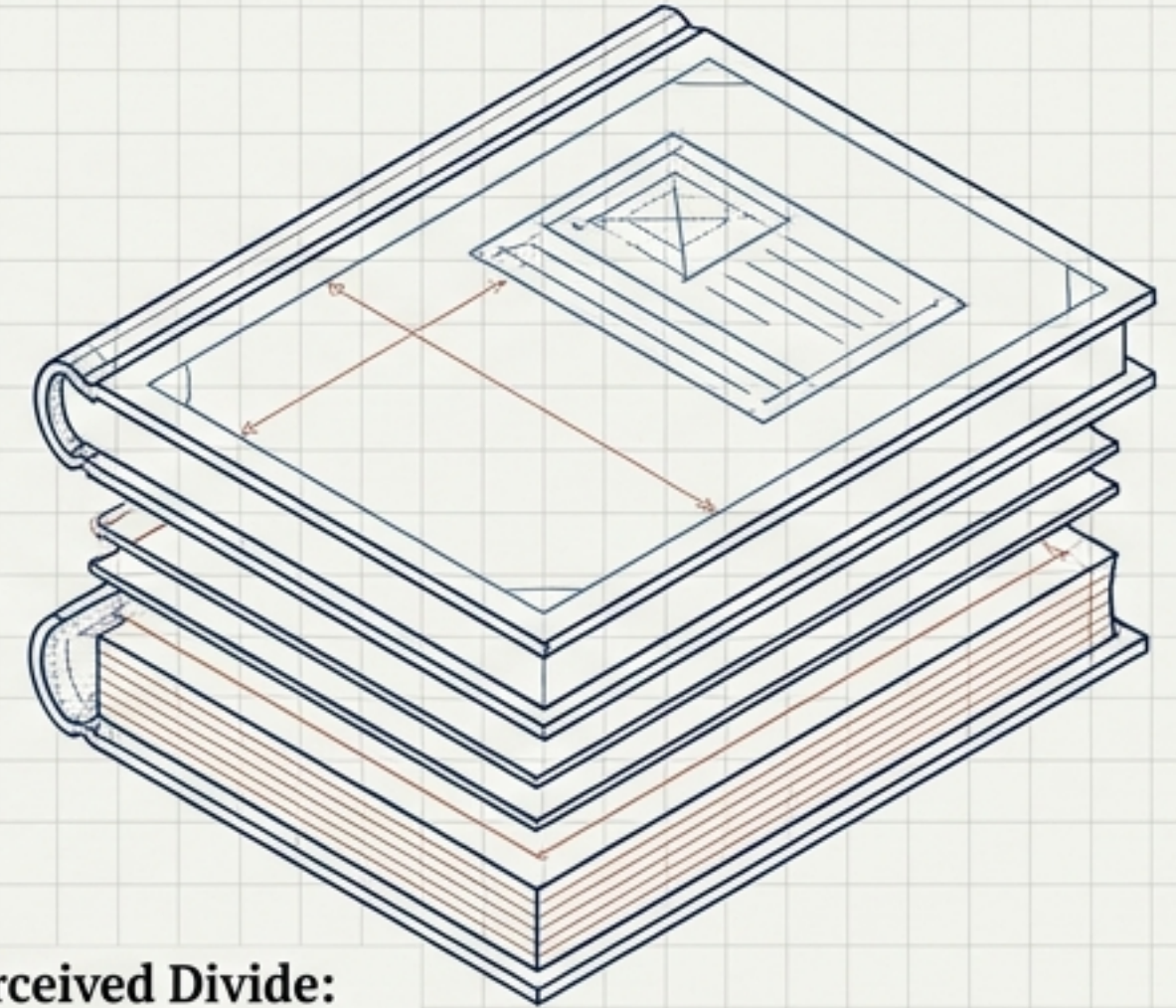
The Pragmatist's Doubt: Why Bother With What Has Been?

or arrest criminals.

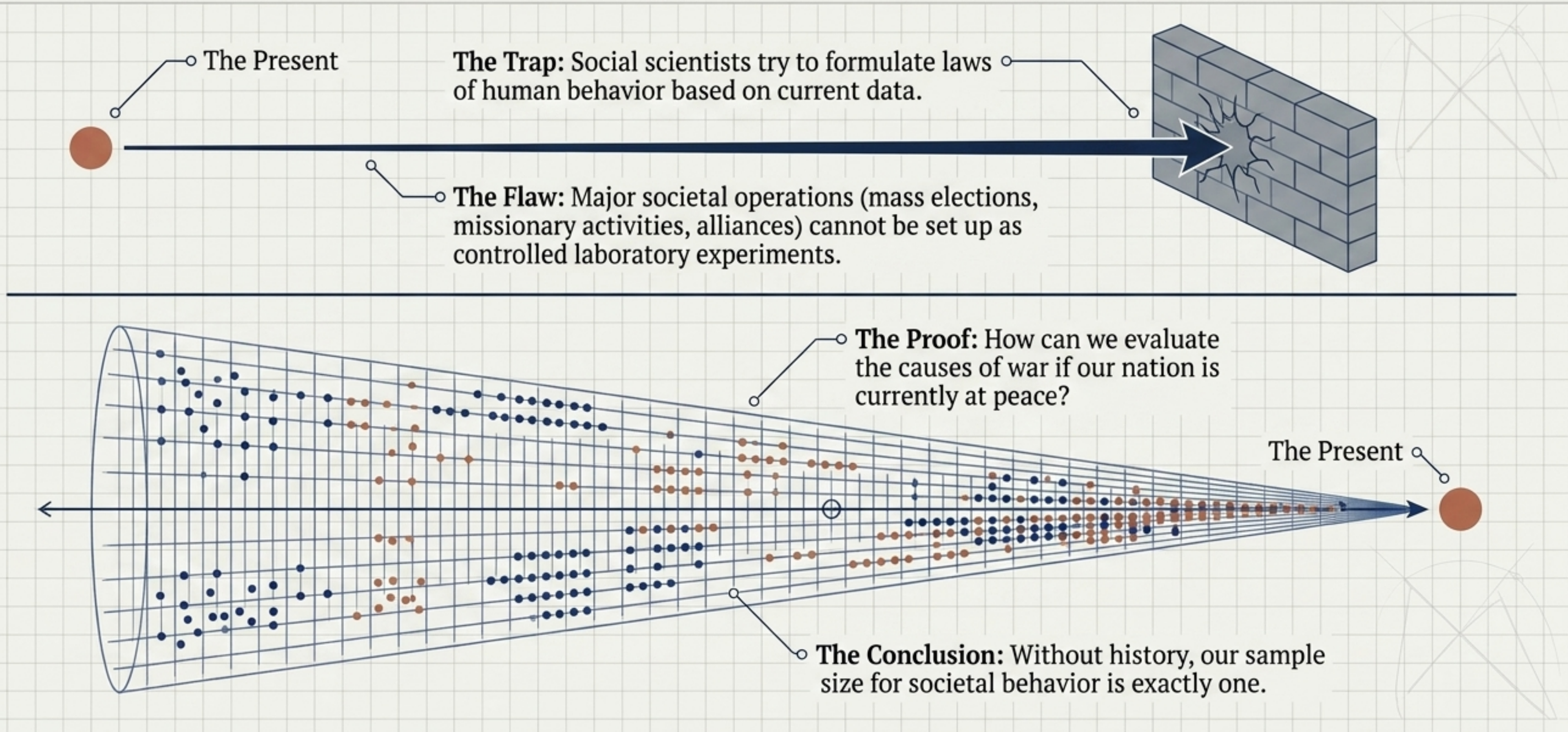


○ **The Perceived Divide:**

engineering or medicine.

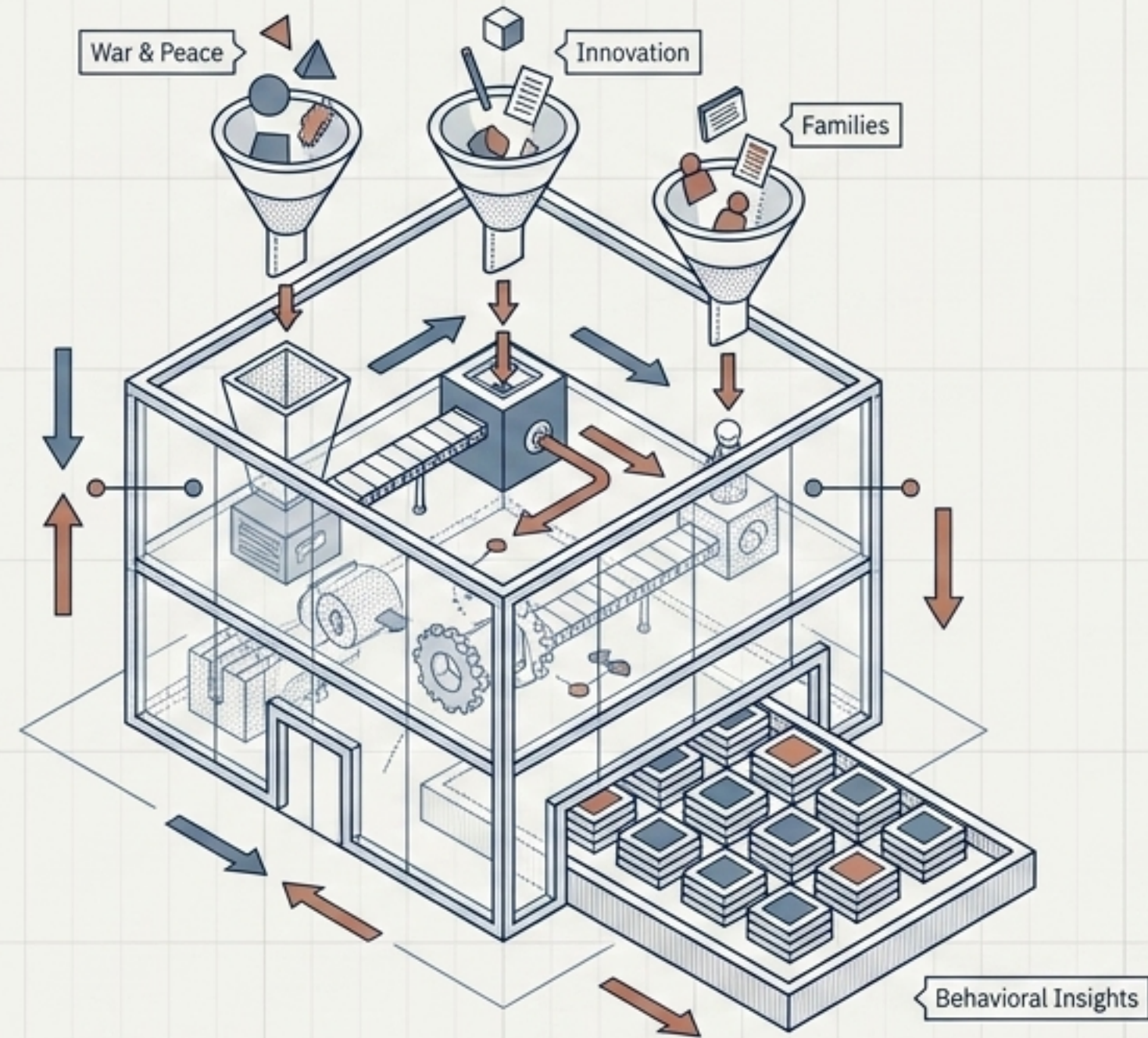
The Paradigm Shift: From Trivia to Toolkit

	Outdated Paradigm	Modern Reality
Primary Purpose	Distinguishing the educated from the uneducated.	Developing analytical habits of mind to navigate complexity.
Core Mechanism	Mindless memorization (e.g., knowing the date 1066 or Wallace's evolutionary theory).	Contemplation, debate, and analysis of societal functions.
Career Function	A screening device for law school or business promotions.	Cultivating broad perspective and adaptability for the long haul.

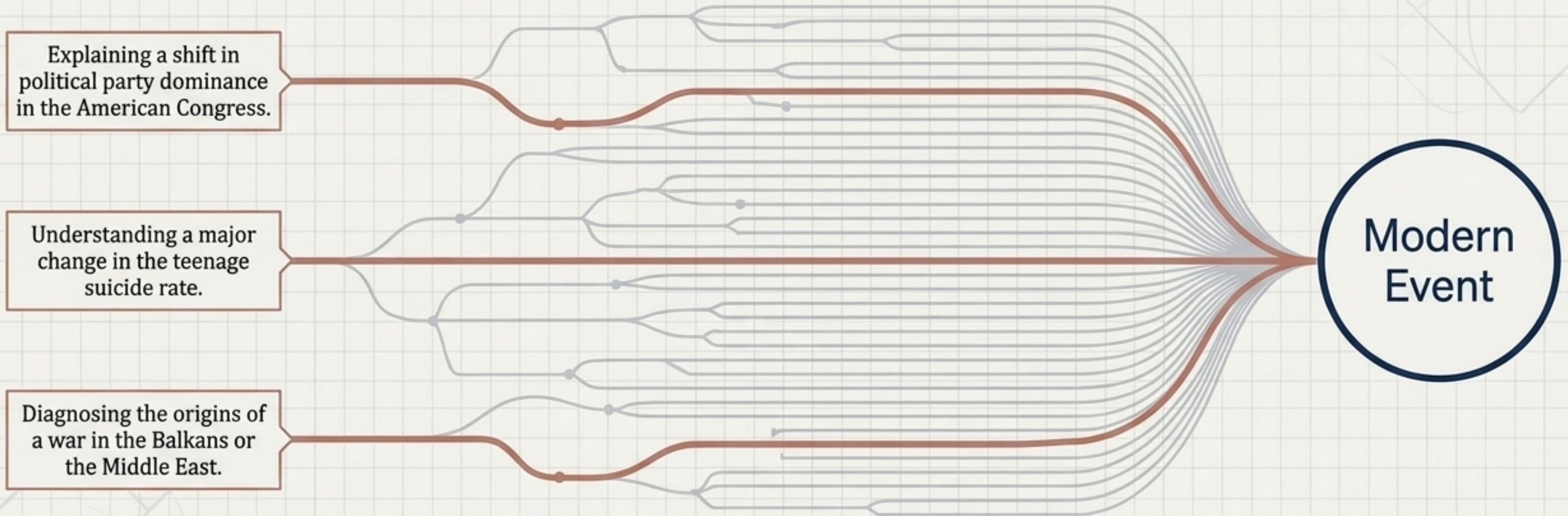

The Four Dimensions of Historical Utility

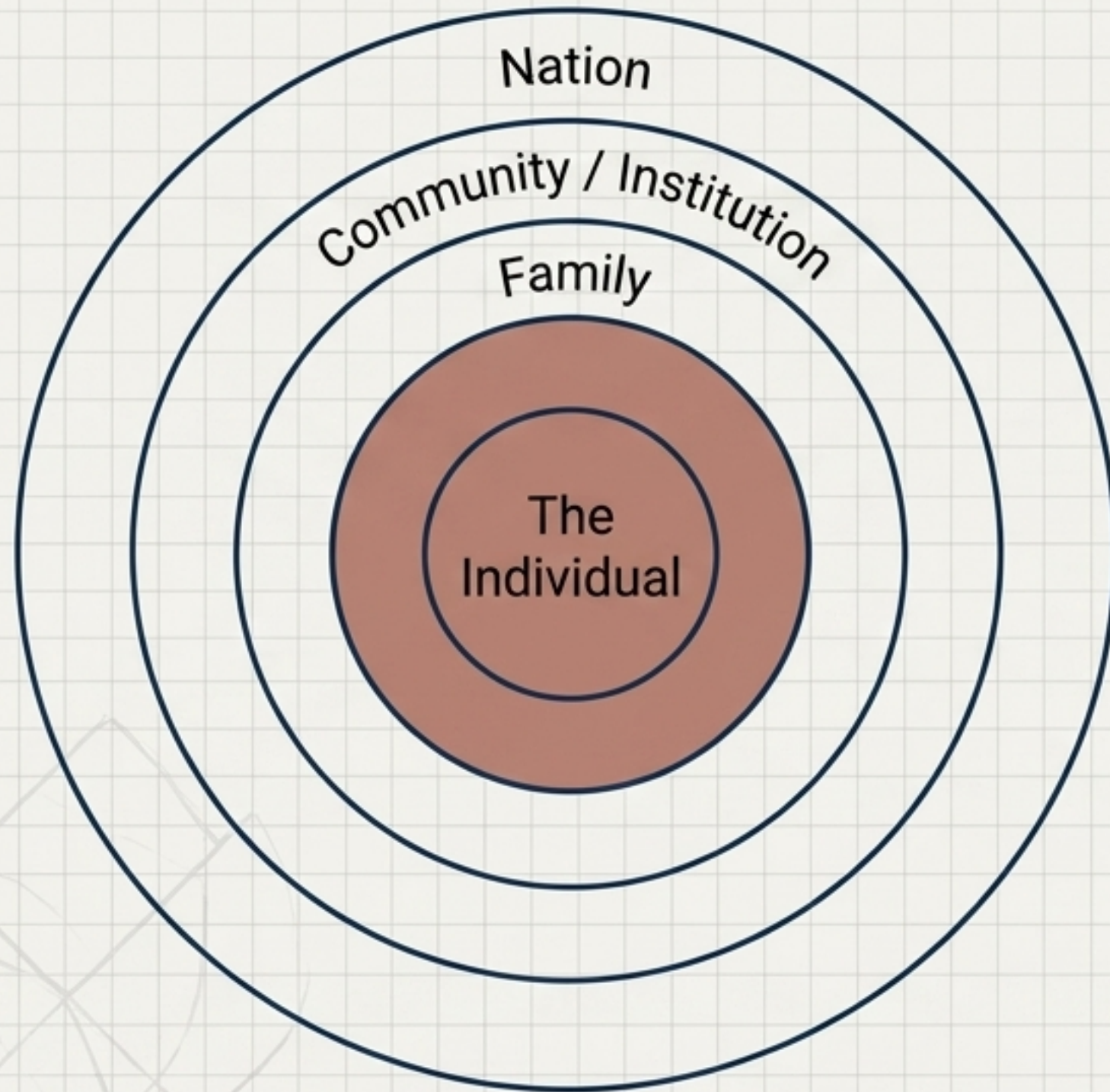
	The Macro Understanding societal change and institutional evolution.		The Micro Forming identity, morality, and individual perspective.

Providing Identity

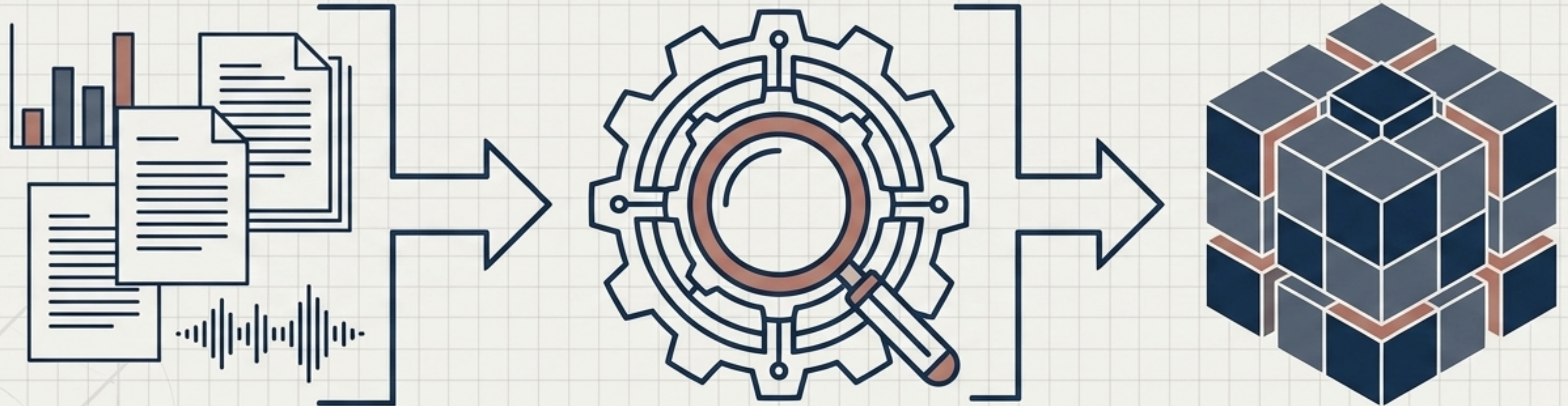
Exploring genealogy provides a basis for understanding how a family has interacted with larger historical change. This scales up to ethnic groups and nations, building cohesion.

Testing the Moral Sense

History provides a terrain for moral contemplation. We hone our ethics against real complexities individuals faced in difficult settings—from certifiable heroes to ordinary people demonstrating courage and constructive protest. (“History teaching by example”).

The Historian's Toolkit I: Assessing Evidence

The study of history builds experience in combining diverse materials (visual, numerical, written) into accurate pictures of reality. This builds the capacity to shape coherent arguments based on varied, often incomplete, datasets.

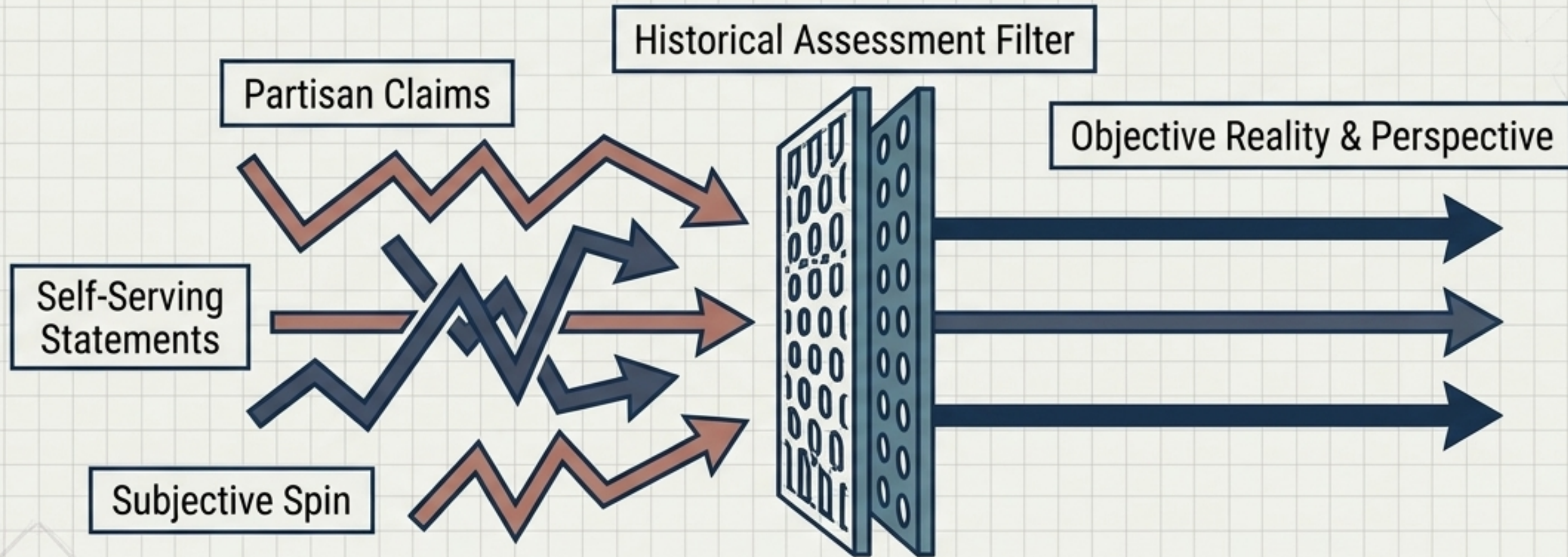

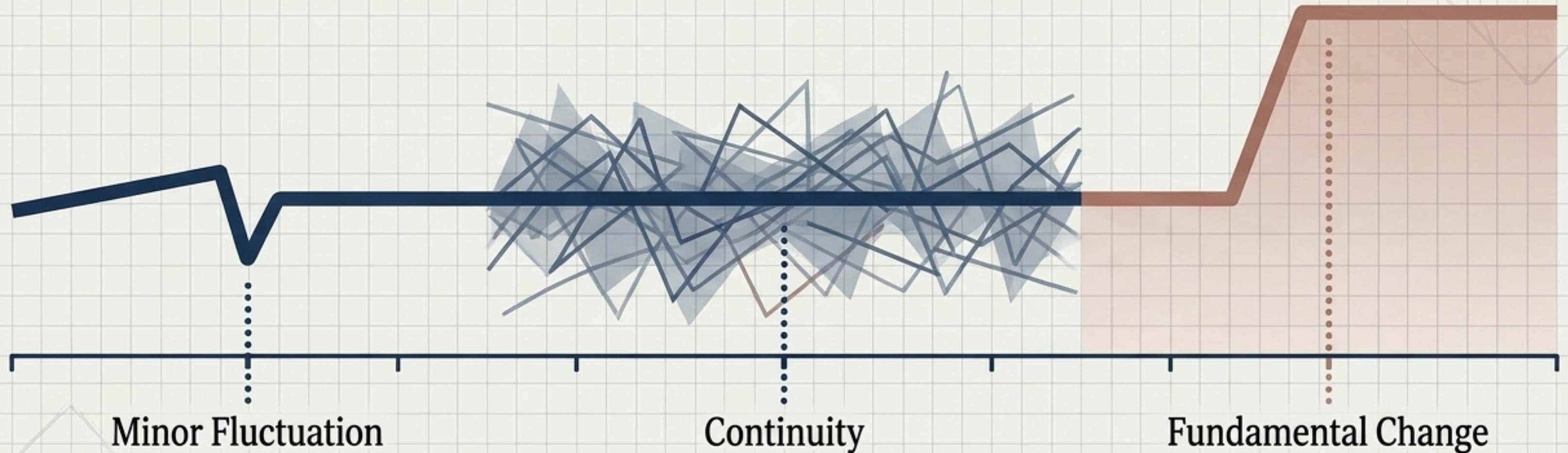


Understanding how societies work is inherently imprecise. History is an often-contested laboratory of human experience.

The Historian's Toolkit III: Measuring the Architecture of Change

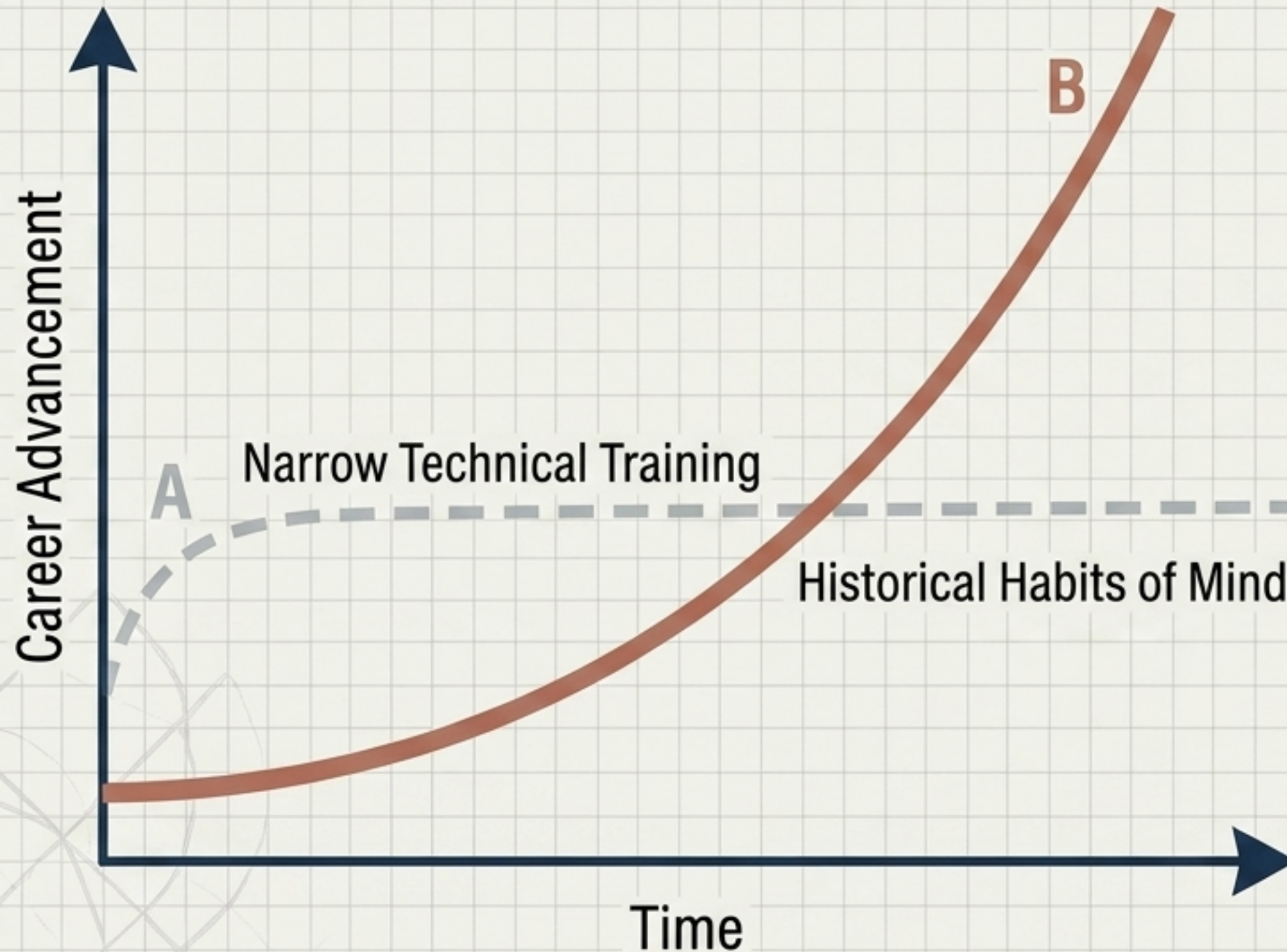


Determine Magnitude

The Career Adaptability Curve

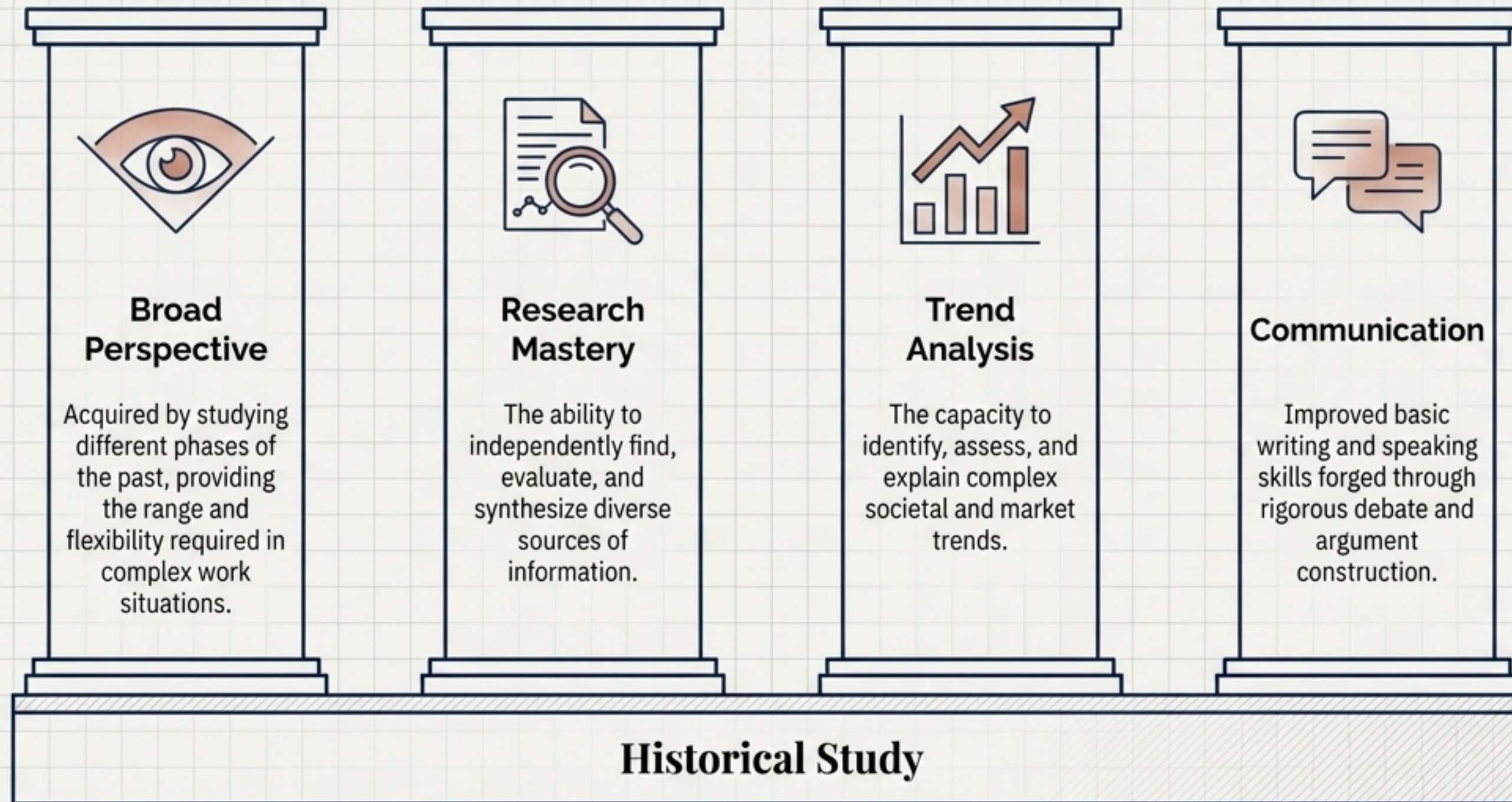


History does not always lead directly to a specific entry-level job slot like technical fields do.

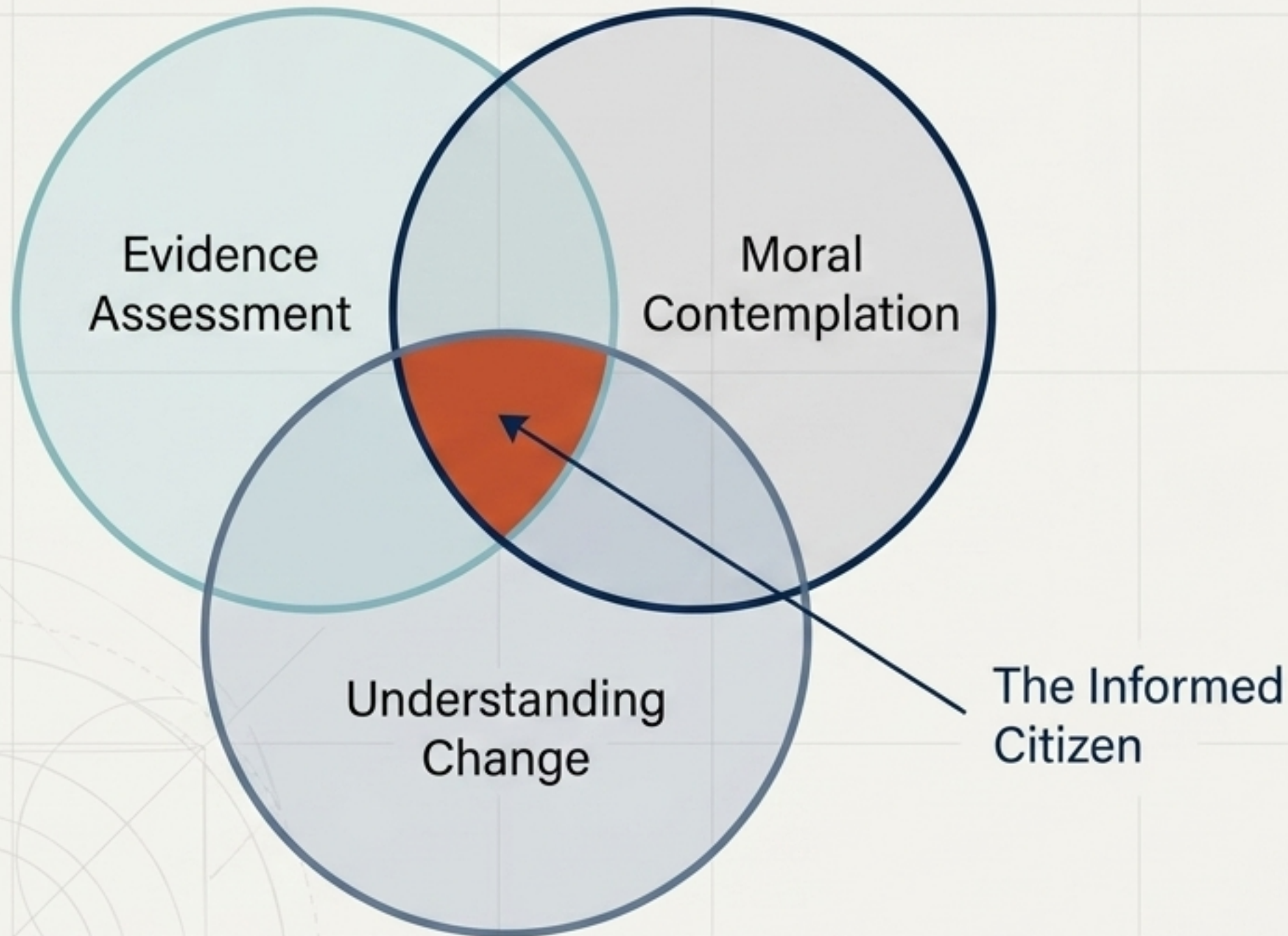
However, historical study particularly prepares students for the long haul.

The broad perspective and flexibility acquired help drive adaptation and advancement far beyond entry-level employment.

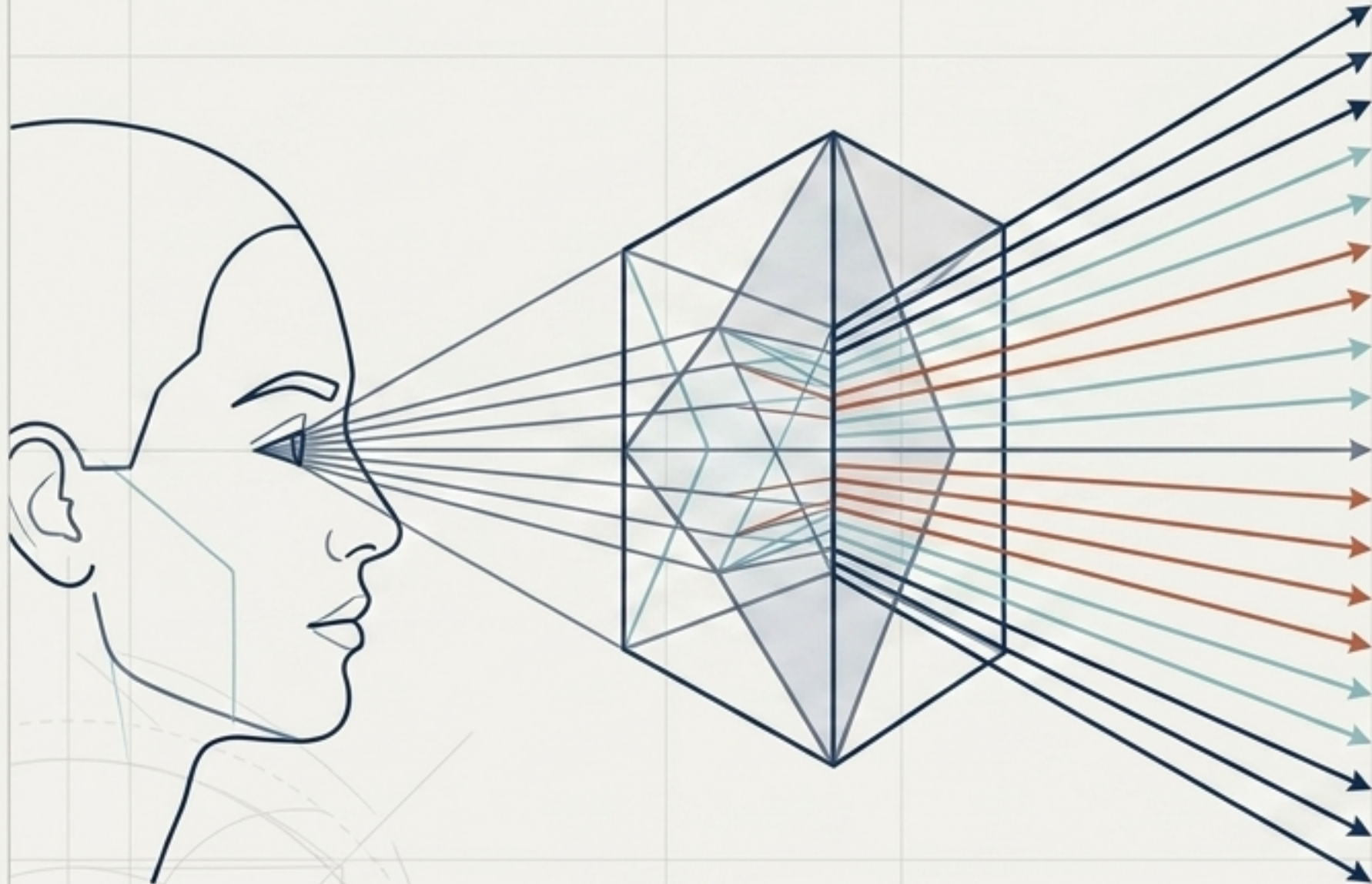

The Anatomy of an Informed Citizen



Historical study is crucial to the promotion of that elusive creature: the well-informed citizen. No one can deal with the present exactly as the historian deals with the past—we lack the distance. But by applying historical habits of mind to contemporary issues, we function as responsible leaders, voters, petitioners, and observers.
