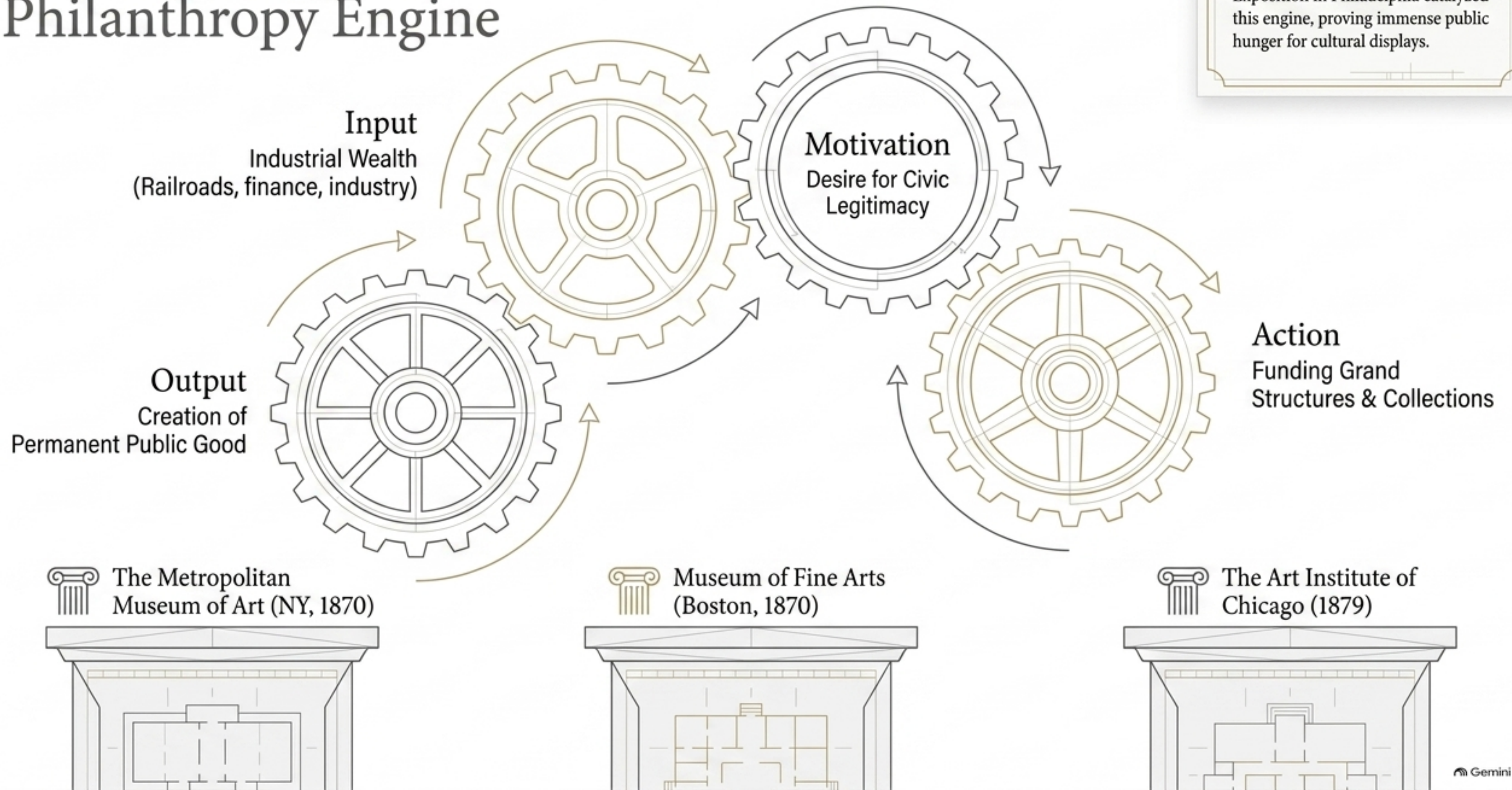

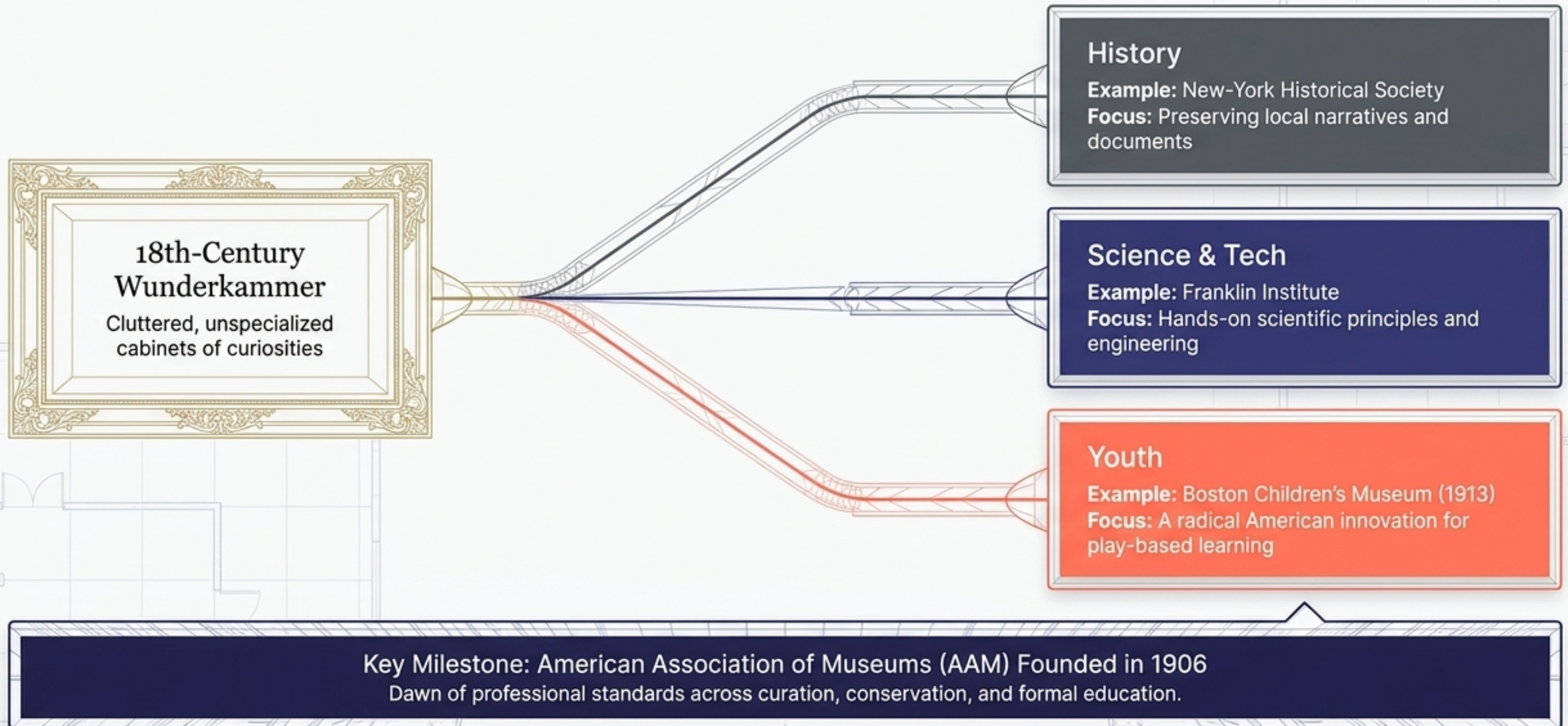


The Gilded Age Philanthropy Engine

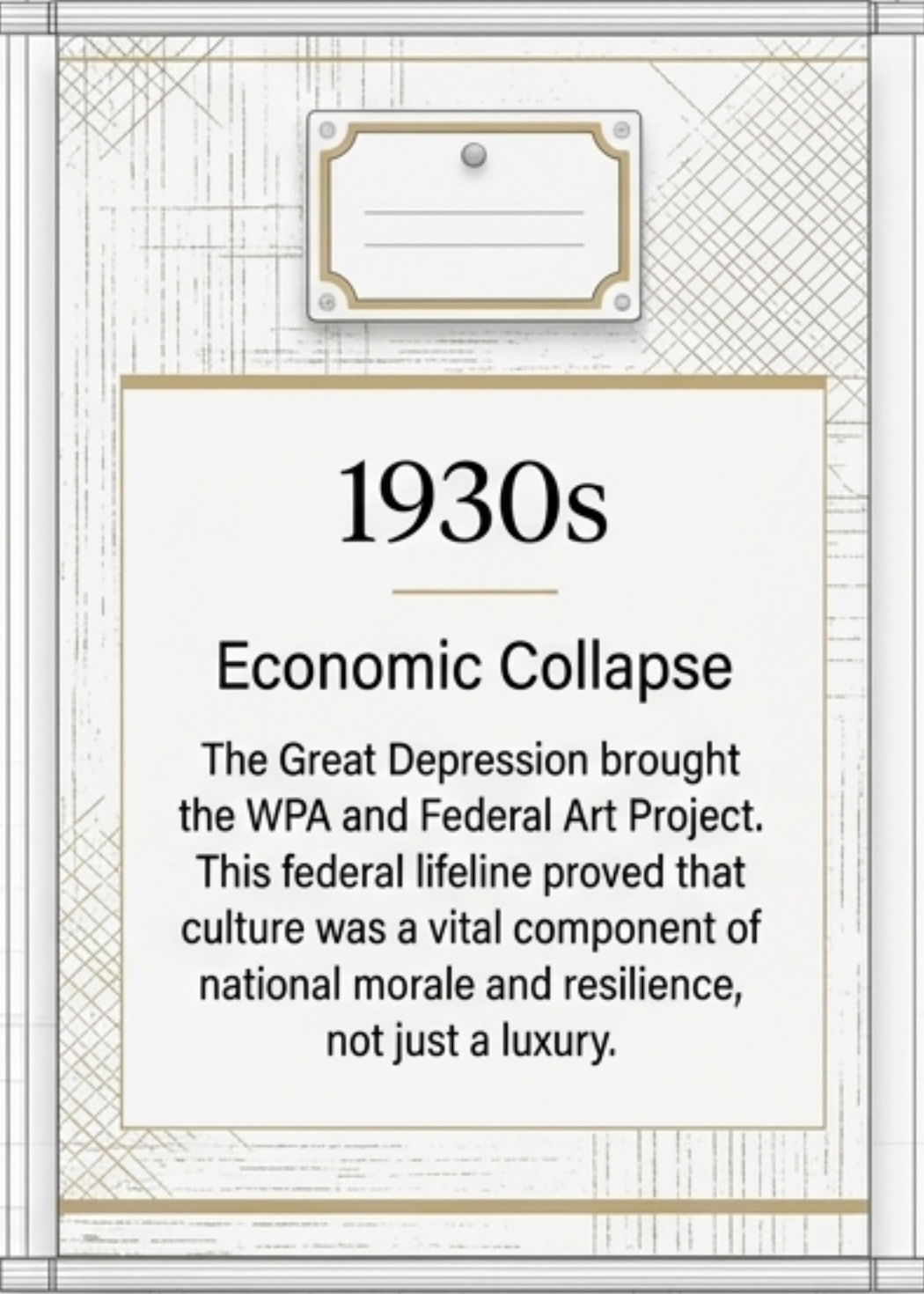
Context: The 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia catalyzed this engine, proving immense public hunger for cultural displays.

Economic Collapse

1940s

Global Conflict

During WWII, museum curators and archivists served as 'Monuments Men', risking their lives on the front lines to protect, document, and recover looted global heritage.



1950s & 60s

Social Upheaval

The Civil Rights Movement issued the first major challenges to the white, Eurocentric 'master narrative', sparking demands for authentic representation and birthing identity-specific institutions.
